





Maintaining public trust and confidence



NPTs are committed to building trust and confidence so people feel safe. Effective engagement and consultation with local communities is the foundation on which neighbourhood policing is built.

Local bases have been retained across the force area to ensure that where possible local officers are based in the localities in which they work.

The force Communications & Engagement Strategy outlines how we work to ensure we build public trust and confidence with our communities and the NPTs play a crucial role in this.

The Engagement Framework sets out in detail the various channels we use to engage with our communities and how we ensure that we focus our time and resource on the issues and audiences that will make the biggest impact.

Humber Talking

As part of a two-way approach to communication and engagement, officers actively listen to what local people have to say and use their feedback to provide a better service. Humber Talking is a prime example of this. Officers are visiting every household in their area. to find out what matters to local residents.

Humber Talking raises the profile of the NPT and is being used to help teams identifying vulnerability either directly or indirectly. The initiative helps to increase the flow of community intelligence and can be implemented in a flexible way to allow areas of emerging concern to be targeted as a priority, as and when intelligence or criminal activity develops.

My Community Alert & social media

My Community Alert also facilitates two way communication and ensures crime prevention messages and crime information can be circulated in real time.

We actively use social media to keep local communities updated using Facebook and Twitter as well as our Humberside Police website. Communities have embraced this and we received feedback through these channels which helps us to assess public trust and confidence as well as engage in two-way conversation directly with the communities

Community meetings

Local officers attend a variety of community meetings such as Neighbourhood Watch, parish and town council meetings as well as making themselves available at informal drop-ins, whilst patrolling and through regular visits to schools.


Each school has a dedicated SPOC under the Safer Schools Partnership Agreement, Regular contact with those on the KINS list is also an important factor of two-way conversations.

2a. What are the issues affecting you in your community which would benefit from joint working between police, partners and community members to resolve











3. How confident are you that the police would be there if you needed them









The confidence cycle

Targeted Enforcement Activities:


DUESBERY STREET railway track to BEVERLEY ROAD - Hull City Council are pricing up fencing to go along the railway platform to stop them from sitting on there and additional fencing on the turning circle of Pearson Park. Recent updates suggest that this will not now occur until FY 2022/23; however, if available funding can be utilised prior to 31/03/22, this may be completed earlier. Patch walks have restarted, with one completed on 10/02/22 alongside HCC ASB team and ward co-ordinator. S23 MDA warrants executed by proactive at WLEBECK STREET, resulting in 1x arrest for PWITS and 10 wraps of class A drugs seized.

Utilising Humber Talking Feedback to Set Priorities and Take Action:

Humber Talking is essentially completed on the Avenues. Priorities focused towards street drinking, tackling drug dealing and drug taking, and enforcing road issues. 25 streets in the ward are currently being re-attended in order to

identify issues raised by local MP Diana Johnson.

The Court has found that in relation to the address Eastgate, Goole, East Riding of Yorkshire DN14 5AR (the premises) that:

1 [a person has engaged in or is likely to engage in [disorderly and OR offensive and OR criminal behaviour] on the premises;

OR

2 the use of the premises has resulted, or (if the order is not made) is likely to result, in serious nuisance to members of the public;

AND/OR

3 there has been, or (if the order is not made) there is likely to be, disorder near the premises and such disorder is associated with the use of the premises

and that the making of a closure order is necessary to prevent the occurrence of such future serious nuisance, similar behavious or disorder

POSITIVE RESULTS FOLLOWING SANDTOFT DAY OF ACTION



The Isle of Axholme Neighbourhood Policing Team (NPT) led a multi-agency day of action around Sandtoft Industrial Estate last Thursday (24 February).

Joined by colleagues from North Lincolnshire Council's Safer Neighbourhoods and Environmental Health teams, the Environment Agency, the DVSA and BT Openreach, as well as officers from Brigg and Ashby NPTs, the group's aim was to provide a high-visibility presence in the area to check on business licences and vehicles.

Having listened to local residents' concerns about activity on the estate, the partners carried out a series of site visits to come up with solutions to identified issues.

PC Sarah Jackson, who led the operation, said: "I would like to thank my colleagues from the police and partner agencies for helping make this a very successful afternoon.

"We have listened to residents through our Humber Talking surveys and recognised the industrial estate was an area of concern for them." Read more about the day of action **here**.

Last week was National Neighbourhood Policing Week, a week all about shining a light on our fantastic and dedicated neighbourhood policing teams.

And what a week it was!

The teams were certainly busy and many of you will have seen or spoken to them, as they visited 89 schools, completed 841 Humber Talking surveys, did 129 hours of patrolling the streets and spoke to over 100 businesses or other partner organisations.

This was on top of the usual enforcement activity, which continued throughout the week with eight warrants, 13 stop searches and 24 arrests.

Hull's Avenues Ward was experiencing ASB, including drugs and street drinking, with regular reports of knife crime.

Humber Talking vas undertaken, as were patchwalks with partners. Through the employment of days of action, a passive drugs dog, media releases and the support of British Transport Police, public confidence improved. While it is too early for a full evaluation of this initiative, the innovation and initial results were more than worthy of recognition.

After reports of ASB, lamping and deer killed for sport on Noddle Hill Nature Reserve, high quality patrols and improved signage were implemented. As part of Resistance conservation group was set up to allow communities to take ownership of their local area. Traps were removed and Humber Talking arrived out, along with media appearances to show how seriously this issue was being taken.

The result was a large reduction in animal cruelty and ASB in the area.

The Westcliff estate in Scunthorpe has suffered deprivation and huge crime rates - accounting for 60% or all reports for the Brumby Ward. Crimes include burglary, OCGs, county lines, cuckooing and ASB. In the Channel 4 programme Skint, it was described as "a terrible place to live". Residents feared reporting crimes.

An environmental visual audit was carried out with police, North Lincolnshire Council and Westcliff residents. Humber Talking that residents wanted change to happen, but were too scared.
